Person-centered dementia care had significant effects on decreasing behavioral symptoms and psychotropic medication use in residents with dementia in long-term care. The outcomes of these culture change and person-centered care studies outlined by Li and Porock (2014) are summarized in the paragraphs that follow.

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Fundamentals of Person-Centered Care for Individuals With ...

A wider range of diseases cause young-onset dementia. A younger person is much more likely to have a rarer form of dementia. Younger people with dementia are less likely to have memory loss as one of their first symptoms. Young-onset dementia is more likely to cause problems with movement, walking, co-ordination or balance.

Multidisciplinary assessment and care planning are needed to address the whole-person impact of dementia. ReSPECT stands for Recommended Summary Plan for Emergency Care and Treatment and it works like this:. ReSPECT starts with someone who may benefit from or want to participate in the ReSPECT process. A two-way discussion then takes place between the person and the healthcare professional to enable

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their current and future state of health to be discussed and their priorities of care to be voiced.
