Teaching Morphology: Enhancing Vocabulary Development and ...

Highlighting the morphology of words is useful for explaining phonics patterns (graphemes) and spelling rules, as well as discovering the meanings of unfamiliar words, and demonstrating how words are linked together. Highlighting and analysing morphemes is also useful, therefore, for providing comprehension strategies.

Every word is a base or a base with somethingelse (another base or affix) Bases and affixes (morphemes) are the meaningfulbuilding blocks that construct words. We can analyze complex words into constituentmorphemes with word sums and show their interrelationship with a matrix.

The distinction turns on whether the unit (the morpheme or word) can stand on its own. Words have to have that kind of independence, while morphemes don't require it. Thus, bags, trucked, running, and redirect are all words in the English language while bag, s, truck, ed, run, ing, re, and direct are all morphemes. Each morphemic unit carries meaning, but sometimes morphemes can do that independently (bag, truck, run, direct), and sometimes they need to be combined with other morphemes to ...

Using Morphological Analysis to Teach Vocabulary In ...

Phonological awareness: Increasing the salience of written morphology could act as a scaffolding tool to build up awareness of speech sounds in struggling readers. One strategy is to link the sounds that make up the word (phonological structure) to it spelling and meaning representation (Bowers, Kirby, & Deacon, 2010).

Teaching Morphology to Improve Literacy

With strong morphological skills, students can approach a novel multisyllabic word and break it into parts in order to predict the meaning. This skill helps in all areas of literacy: decoding, spelling, comprehension, and oral language.

Morphology and Etymology - Vocab Strategies

Word webs are used to teach students to identify base words, affixes and spelling patterns. These can be done individually, in groups or as a whole class. Orthography and basic morphology word webs are suitable for Grades 3-4. Complex morphology and etymology word webs are better suited to grades 5-6 (Winch et al., 2013).
